

It's appropriate that *Six Days in Fallujah* has been sitting in development hell since the time it was first announced, it was going to be the first game to directly reference the Iraq War, though that ship has long since sailed.

It was to be published by a company that had a strong regard for Arabs in gaming, but the company dropped the original studio, Atomic Mass Games, went bankrupt in 2011.

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
